

SELECTMEN'S MEETING

March 18, 1982

Present were Sel. Olson, Sel. Mansfield and secretary.

A group of concerned citizens from the Laurel Lane and Mason Drive area came in to complain about the condition of the roads, explaining that it is near impossible to continue traveling these roads without getting stuck or damaging their cars. Those present were Luther Farley, Paul Dionne, Normand Albert and present to complain about the condition of Bedford Road was Lorraine Bergeron. The Selectmen called Road Agent, Almus Chancey, to be present to listen to the complaints. As back-up to this group, phone calls were received from Jacqueline Malandrino and Mrs. Debra O'Brien. Mr. Dionne said trucks were the big offenders to the condition of the roads whereupon Sel. Olson informed them that the Selectmen had stopped all logging trucks from operation until the mud season has eased. Road Agent Chancey explained that because of the weight of the gravel trucks, they cause more damage in the process of repairing the roads than what can be accomplished. They are now handling smaller loads at a time which works out a little better. He promised he will make a real effort to correct the problem ~~was~~ roads.

Martha Brooks, Conservation Commission, stepped in to ask the Selectmen to reappoint the members that served on the Commission last year.

Scott McQuade dropped by to report his research in finding someone who could inspect the library addition making sure all specifications were followed. He found a Mr. Tom Sardi, a structural engineer, who would review the building for \$45 per hour. ~~The Selectmen~~ <sup>Olson</sup> felt that to bring this man on the job would be challenging the architect's integrity. Sel. Mansfield felt it would be up to town counsel whether the town should spend the extra money for this purpose. This matter will be under consideration only.
