Hello everyone,

Over the past two months, a few people have asked how the town's default budget will affect the Recreation Department. As Recreation Director, I oversee the day-to-day operations of our budget. We did have to make some major cuts when the town budget failed on March 28. We eliminated our entire grounds keeping line, along with the entire staff training/workshop line. Other items had to be cut back, including bus fuel and bus maintenance. Due to these budget decreases, we are unable to offer bus trips every month of the year. You will see there are no trips scheduled for the months of July and August.

As we go through the summer, I will be monitoring the condition of our budget to determine how many trips will be possible through the remainder of this year, and into early 2024. Remember, the town votes in March every year. With default budgets becoming more prevalent, we now have to be conservative in January, February and March.

Sheri and I thoroughly enjoy offering these trips to our residents but the budget dictates everything we do, and don't do, in town government. We thank you for your patience and support as we work through the default budget this year. Don't hesitate to contact us with any questions or concerns.

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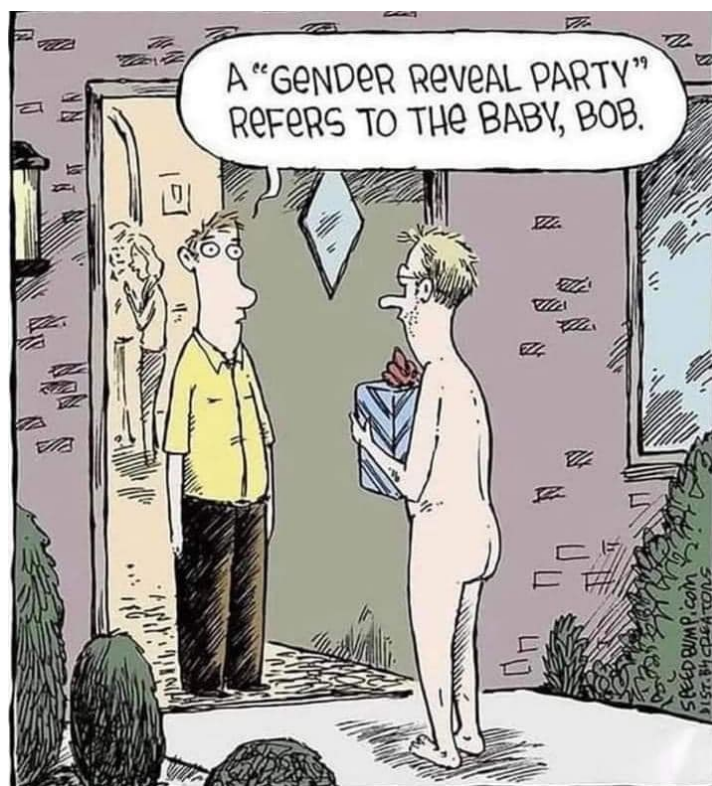
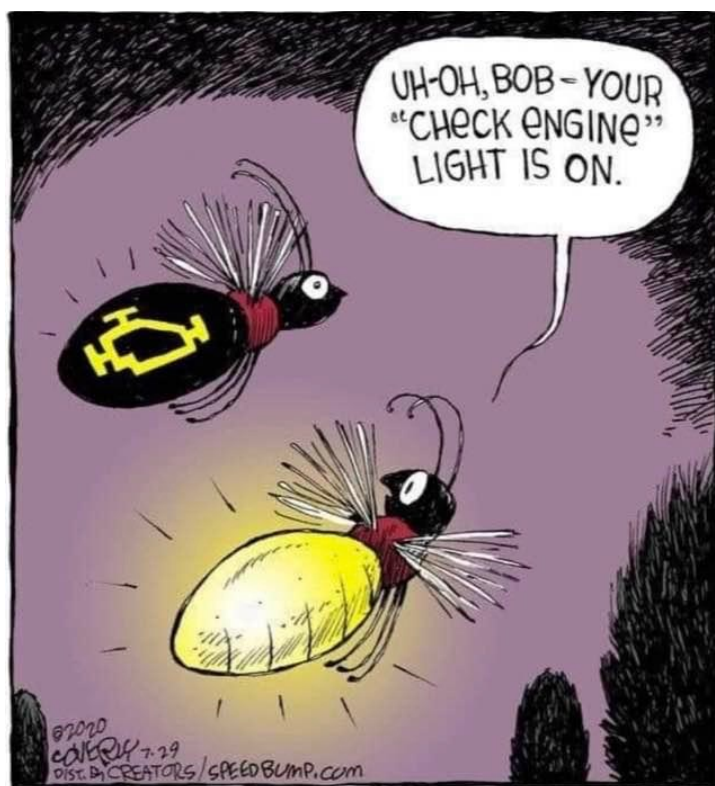

# "King Charles III and a New Boston diary" OR

## "I've an answer for that, too!"\*

\* Note—Your Senior Newsletter Editor left off the ending to Dan’s story that appeared in the May / June issue of the gazette. Fortunately the spot that I accidentally cut off was a perfect cliff hanger. Please enjoy the full story and conclusion of “King Charles III and a New Boston diary”, with my sincere apologies to Dan.

If all goes according to plan, King Charles III and his wife Camilla will be crowned this month, May 2023. Now you may ask, is the King of England relevant to Americans 250 years after the Revolution? Yes he is!

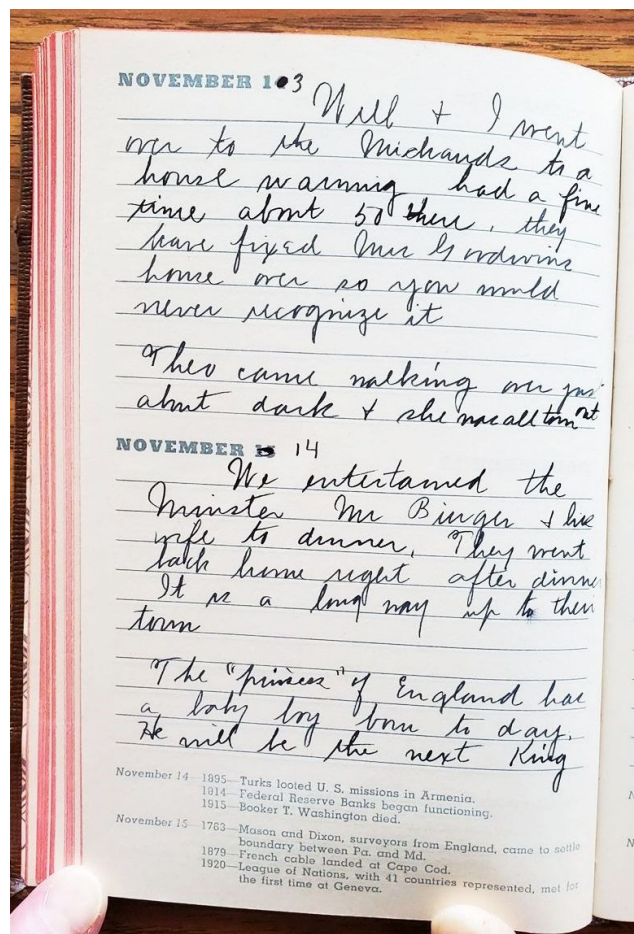
For example, the King’s name recently appeared in a legal dispute between the Governor of Florida and the Disney Corporation. When the Governor moved to take control of the land upon which Disneyworld is built, the Disney board quickly adopted a new provision preserving their authority until “21 years after the death of the last survivor of the descendants of King Charles III, king of England, living as of the date of this declaration.”

When I read that in the newspaper, I wanted to know, what was that all about??? What I’ve learned is that the “royal lives clause” is well-known in legal circles, in both England and America. Apparently the clause is used for property transactions where you can’t grant rights “in perpetuity,” or forever. Given that Charles’s youngest grandchild, Lilibet, is not quite two years old, the “royal lives clause” may provide Disney certain rights for a hundred years, which is indeed forever from my perspective.

At this point, “Center of Gravity” readers may wonder, what is the relevance of King Charles III to New Boston, New Hampshire? I’ve an answer for that, too!

The Historical Society is fortunate to have many years of daily diaries written by Ellen Orinda Dodge and her daughter-in-law Cora Dodge. My wife Lisa has been reading these diaries and making notes about entries of particular interest. She tells me that on November 14, 1948, Cora Dodge wrote in her diary: “The princess of England had a baby boy born today. He will be the next King.” The princess, who was Elizabeth, became the Queen in 1952, and her baby boy born on November 14 was Charles, who’s now the King.

How quickly news traveled from England all the way to New Boston! No doubt Cora and her husband Will listened to the radio every evening for news of the world. I’ll bet that Cora had no idea it would take 75 years for her prediction about “the next King” to come true!

## "From the Northeast Kingdom to New Boston"

In late May I went to the farmers' market in Frankestown to buy some cheese made on South Hill in New Boston. The museums were open so I went into the big barn. They have there a stagecoach and also a lovely old Dodge motorcar, dark red and black and chrome. I talked with a man named Robert Abbott who used to own the old Dodge, and he told me it had been stored in New Boston for a number of years at the Bog Road home of Butch and Margot Johnston. In fact Margot was his cousin, he said. I knew I had a Margot Johnston story, but I couldn't remember it at the time. I had to drive up to the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont to recollect the story I'll tell you today.

My sister-in-law Joan Alexander is a volunteer at the Historical Society in Glover VT, north of Saint Johnsbury. In 2015 Joan worked with Glover 4th graders, researching the history of people who lived in their town a hundred years ago. They looked into the story of one little girl named Ida Mae Jerome as documented in newspapers and town records. They discovered that Ida's mother died young and her father had difficulty supporting his children. Ida herself married at age 20, had four children, and also died young. The students wanted to know: what became of Ida's children? Their project was an exercise in learning how to research using birth, marriage, and death records, Internet resources, old maps, and a visit to the Vermont State Archives.

The students weren't able to find answers to all of their questions, nor could they find a photo of Ida, but as one wrote, "We had a lot of fun doing this project!" Joan promised them she wouldn't give up, and the very next year she was able to show her young history detectives, now 5th graders, a photo of Ida Jerome as a married woman with two of her children. Later Joan was able to locate the daughter of Ida's third child, Alice, and that was Margot Johnston of New Boston, NH!



My sister-in-law Joan met Margot the next time she came to New Boston to visit Lisa and me. Margot had been adopted as a child, and she told Joan an interesting story of her own successful search for her birth parents. Some years later, after her husband Butch died in 2021, Margot Johnston moved to Georgia to live near her children, and that's where she is today. I thank Joan and Margot for their help with this story.

# Home Fire Safety Checklist



## Cooking Safety

- "Keep an eye on what you fry." Stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling or using an open flame.



## Fireplaces, Space Heaters, Baseboards, etc.

- "3 feet from the heat." Furniture, curtains, dish towels and anything that could catch fire are at least 3 feet from any type of heat source.



## Smoking Safety

- Never smoke in bed.



## Electrical and Appliance Safety

- Large and small appliances are plugged directly into wall outlets.



## Children Playing

- Matches and lighters are locked away.



## Smoke Alarms

- Make sure you have working smoke alarms. Different types of smoke alarms, ionization and photoelectric, detect fire in different ways. Experts recommend having both types in your home.
- Change smoke alarm batteries every year unless it has a long-life battery.
- Replace smoke alarms every ten years.
- A combination of working smoke alarms and fire sprinklers decreases the risk of dying in a home fire

## Home Fire Escape Plan

At least twice a year, use your home fire escape plan to practice your 2-minute drill with all your family members. Practice makes perfect! After each fire drill, mark down your escape time.

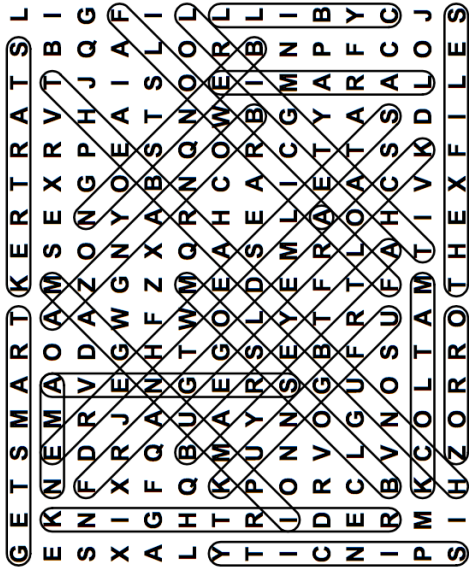
